Having come to WKU from a very small high school where we were lucky to have 3 parts sing at the same time, Western's choral program was a dream come true.




Going to Europe confirmed to me that I really enjoyed international travel and culture. Experiencing the cathedrals and sights brought emotions I never knew



Becoming involved in WKU's Vocal and Choral program completely changed the course of my life. I had no intention of becoming a classical musician not that I didn't like it, I had just never considered it a possibility, until I got involved at WKU.

Meeting Dr. Hausmann, all of you all and being in the choir were overwhelming experiences for me when I look back on it. I had NO idea what I was doing and you all took me in as if I belonged. I can't tell you how much that means to me still today.

Touring is something I love doing, travelling to do music. There is nothing better than having a mission when you travel. I love working while I travel so our choir tour was just that. We weren't just "gawking American tourists" we were musicians on a mission.

The tour made me realize that when you perform the concentration it takes to create that kind of high level detail can only be established in the rehearsals you do. Being really well prepared makes performing easier and when I look back on it I believe Dr. Hausmann prepared us very well for that tour as he did all of our concerts. I don't ever remember going in not feeling confident that we knew what we were doing.

Looking back at the 35 years since my experience at WKU and what held true throughout my life is that you are constantly meeting new people and entering into new situations. When I got involved in the music program at WKU it changed the people in my life. It isn't just a matter of different surroundings, buildings, towns, cities and countries, it feels like you are being parachuted into a completely new existence.

There is a level of faith that is involved in music. I didn't know anything about anything and I had no idea about how good or bad I was or if I could keep up, which held true throughout my career. Choir was such an intense thing because I didn't want to be the weak link and mess up everything for the rest of the group. But, you have to trust that you can do it. It is answering the question that lurks inside, "Are the gifts God gave me and my work worthy of being a part of something so outstanding?" I'm so grateful to have met that standard with you all and that together we could support each other in that goal.


I have been extremely fortunate during the 35 years being able to walk through several doors of opportunity that became the stepping stones of my career, and no stone is something you ever take for granted. Having performed as a full time leading tenor in the theaters in Bremerhaven, Osnabrück, Karlsruhe, Gelsenkirchen, Wuppertal, Bonn, Krefeld-Mönchengladbach as well as in many other German theaters as a guest was a gift that can't be cherished enough. 
- Teaching high school choral music for 4 years and taking an a cappella ensemble to Bavaria and Prague.


The Chamber Singers European Tour was, definitely, the epitome of my college career and one of the most





NEVILLE MARRINER



Fondateur et Directeur de l'Academy of Saint-Martin in the Fields

Né à Lincoln, en Angleterre en 1924.

Reçoit ses premières leçons de violon de son père.

Obtient une bourse pour aller étudier au Royal College of Music de Londres, en 1940.

A la fin de la seconde guerre mondiale, rencontre, dans un hôpital militaire, le musicologue et claveciniste Thurston Dart avec qui il formera plus tard un duo.

Après la guerre, termine ses études au Royal College of Music, puis au Conservatoire National de Paris où il étudie le violon sous la direction de René Benedetti.

Enseigne la musique pendant un an au Collège d'Eton.

Est nommé professeur à la Royal Academy of Music en 1948.

De 1948 à 1954, il est membre-fondateur de plusieurs ensembles tels que le Martin String Quartet, le Virtuoso String Trio et le Jacobean Ensemble.

En 1956, il est nommé chef de pupitre des seconds violons du London Symphony Orchestra.

Il travaille la direction d'orchestre avec Pierre Monteux, aux États-Unis et fonde, en 1957, l'Academy of Saint-Martin in the Fields.

Chef et Directeur artistique du Los Angeles Chamber Orchestra depuis 1969, il dirige régulièrement cette formation sur la côte Ouest des U.S.A.

Il dirige également l'orchestre de chambre de la Royal Academy of Music de Londres et fait travailler les Instruments à cordes de la Music Society de l'Université de Cambridge.

Sous sa direction, l'Academy of Saint-Martin in the Fields remporte successivement — en 1968, 1969, 1970 — trois Prix Edison (Grand Prix du Disque Hollandais).

En 1970, il enregistre pour Philips avec l'Academy: «Naissance de la Symphonie», «Anthologie de la Symphonie», incluant les œuvres de J.S. Bach, Haydn, Mozart et Beethoven.

Il effectue des tournées en Allemagne avec le Northern Sinfonia ; en Australie, Extrême - Orient et Japon avec l'Academy ; aux États - Unis avec le Los Angeles Chamber Orchestra. Puis emmène l'Academy of Saint Martin in the Fields en France au cours de deux saisons consécutives.

Il est, depuis 1979, Directeur musical de l'Orchestre du Minnesota (à Minneapolis, U.S.A.).

Marié, Neville Marriner partage son temps entre Londres et sa maison en Cornouailles ; son fils est clarinettiste dans un orchestre national de jeunes musiciens, tout en poursuivant ses études ; sa fille fait des études d'archéologie à l'Université d'Oxford, tandis que Mrs Marriner est spécialiste de langue saxonne et d'anglais ancien.

C'est Pierre Monteux qui a révélé à Neville Marriner ses dons de chef d'orchestre : «Au lieu de diriger assis de votre place, levez - vous donc !» lui a -t-il dit en écoutant l'Academy of Saint-Martin in the Fields. C'est ce que fait maintenant Marriner, qui partage désormais son temps entre ses orchestres de chambre et sa carrière de chef invité.

PHILHARMONIA HUNGARICA

Cet ensemble orchestral a fait ses débuts en 1957 lorsqu'un groupe de musiciens hongrois émigrés est venu s'installer en Allemagne.

Ils donnèrent leur premier concert de réputation internationale en mai 1958 à la Salle Pleyel avec un soliste prestigieux : Yehudi Menuhin.

En 1960 : année internationale des émigrés, ils obtinrent une subvention des Nations Unies.

En 1968 : la Philharmonia Hungarica a enregistré l'intégrale des 104 symphonies de Haydn (ce qui représente 48 disques de longue durée) qui contribua à les faire connaître dans le monde entier. Ils obtinrent à cette occasion des prix discographiques et, à partir de ce moment, libérés des contraintes matérielles, ils entamèrent une carrière internationale. En 25 ans, ils ont déjà fait 17 fois le tour du monde et ont joué avec les plus grands chefs d'orchestre.
